To make that fresh start, you had taken a look at your future and then boldly, creatively transformed your spaces for ministry. You thought carefully about what was needed for current users and those yet to come. You worked together with a vision that's been supported by generosity and excitement.

That "working together" thing is defining St John's as much as the new spaces. But rather than being done and over like building construction, working together is ongoing, with possibilities for new relationships and new ideas for doing things. Worship, fellowship, serving, learning, fixing, feeding all happen because you're working together, each one of you pulling toward a vision of St John's being a place of energetic hope and grace.

On Sunday, September 9th there's an opportunity to get a fresh start on <u>working together</u> after a good summer by participating in God's Work, Our Hands. There's a line-up of projects to help others, as St John's partners with ELCA congregations throughout the United States on this special day. Most of the projects will be available immediately following worship and all are suitable for all ages:

- Prepare and deliver treats with thank yous to <u>Wilmette first responders</u>. Making trays of goodies and taking them to the police and fire stations
- Make some knots in a <u>Lutheran World Relief</u> quilt. It takes more than 70 of them to attach each hand-crafted top to its underlayers. These quilts will provide warmth and shelter for those who are refugees, impoverished or disaster-struck
- Haul out a box or 2 of the many books for donation to get rooms ready for Sunday school and Family Promise. Time for the final clean-out to prep for the new year of ministry

- Create flowers and cards for <u>at-home members</u> and beautifying the fellowship space
- Write a postcard to your Congressperson in support of ways to address <u>families</u>' <u>hunger and nutrition needs</u>. Bread for the World organizes and provides information for hunger advocacy, and provides templates and examples for these effective postcards and letters
- Set up tables and chairs for the <u>St John's neighborhood</u> ice cream social. That's right! The Ice Cream Social will be from noon-2:00 pm. It's FREE and it's so easy to invite your neighbors and friends to enjoy an end-of-summer treat with you
- Brother Dano's Sandwiches will also be making the monthly bag meals for The Night Ministry at 4:00 pm

Income -

Revenues are running at 81% of our budget.

Expenses - July had several bills that took its toll on our cash position. The replacement thermostat in our sanctuary and another for the boiler was \$855. The handicap lift needed a pressure test and contract renewal for \$1,210. Electric charges for the air conditioning in our gathering space, although reasonable, were an additional \$130 more than our regular monthly bill.

In trying to find ways to cut expenses, we have stopped our subscription to Wilmette Life (savings of \$95) and the Living Lutheran magazine (savings of \$548). Copies will no longer be sent directly to your home, but they will still be available at church.

Robert has come forward with several proposals to decrease the music budget, but don't impact the quality of music we all love. The council has approved the new budget which will be a savings of \$5,000 for the remainder of 2018 and \$7,600 in 2019.

<u>Ministries</u> - St. John's is a thriving, caring community of members whose generosity will continue to grow in volunteering and stewardship. Let us know how we can help you on your road to fulfilling your purpose as a disciple of Jesus.

<u>Benevolences</u> - The Staff Bake Sale garnered \$758 for the ELCA Disaster Response to the Guatemala Fuego volcano relief. Along with several members' donations, we sent well over \$1,100 for this disaster. We have paid 7 months of our benevolence to the Synod. Hillside Pantry was restocked with food from our collection worth several hundred dollars.

The executive committee and council have taken a look at the amount in the budget set aside for other benevolences. \$3,600 was designated for Sandwich Ministry and \$6,175 for other benevolences. Because the Sandwich Ministry already had \$1,177 in restricted funds for that purpose, we decided to use that offset to be able to send \$1,800 to Lutheran Campus Ministries at Northwestern. Considering our cash position, we will not be able to fund any more benevolences, other than Synod, from our budget for the remainder of the year. Please don't forget that our Extended Ministries Fund paid out \$15,000 in benevolences this year.

What on earth (or in heaven) is "High Church Blended"?

When colleagues ask me what is the prevailing style of music in my church, I usually tell them it is "High Church Blended." I say this primarily for shock value since "High Church" and "Blended" are not categories that traditionally go together, and given my famously impish sense of humor, combined with a general aversion to being pegged begged as either "Conservative" or "Progressive," I must confess that I take a certain degree of delight in the puzzled reactions I receive. I use "High Church Blended" in a slightly tongue and cheek way since I don't consider worship at St. John's to be particularly "High Church," the threshold for which, in my understanding, is when you need your GPS to get to altar because you are lost in a fog of incense. Then you might be High Church.

In practical terms though, this is what I mean by the phrase. "High Church," for my purposes, refers to a commitment to the continued use of the historical liturgy of the Church, and particularly the liturgy as a mode of worship that is primarily *sung*. From the earliest days of the church, most of the liturgy was either sung or chanted, and even in Luther's time the only part of the communion service that wasn't sung was the sermon, though one could of course imagine Vater Martin breaking out into song from the pulpit. At the Calvin Institute on Christian Worship that I attended in January, I heard a Reformed speaker talk about the use of "short songs" used for various liturgical elements, say for the absolution after confession, or the prayer of illumination before the scripture reading. Such things are being rediscovered by those in the Reformed tradition after they fell out of use in that tradition 500 years ago. But they were never lost by the Lutherans. Indeed, I was extremely encouraged by this, since in the past year I had starting using short contemporary songs for the various elements in the Lutheran liturgy. Song, whether old or new, elevates worship because it elevated the intellect, the emotions and the soul, and thus I always aim to have as much song as possible in worship.

This brings me to the term "Blended," which I understand as a liturgical musical aesthetic which mixes "traditional" and "contemporary" music. "Traditional" and "contemporary" are notorious slippery terms which mean different things to different people. For our brothers and sisters in the Eastern Orthodox Church, everything written after about the year 500 is contemporary, and for Evangelicals in their 20's, everything written before 2010 might as well be Mozart. I think the consensus view is that "traditional" means metrical hymns played on an organ, and "contemporary" means pop-influenced music written after 1970, played on any instrument except the organ. Now recalling my famously impish sense of humor, I love to confound these categories. I have played songs by the Getty's and Chris Tomlin on the organ, and I have played "Praise to the Lord the Almighty" as a praise song with the band. I love mixing genres like a cook mixes spices, and so I take the word "blended" to mean nothing more than a mix of lots of different styles and aesthetics, the more the merrier.

Putting all this together, what I mean by "High Church Blended" is a style of worship that hews closely to the ancient liturgy of the church, includes as much singing as possible, and mixes as many musical styles as possible, both old and new. I view this project as being quintessentially Lutheran. Vater Martin did not through out the liturgical baby out with the baptistery, as Calvin did, but retained the form of the ancient liturgy in a way that was accessible to the people. His music was a mix of old an new - chants that were hundreds of years old translated into the vernacular, Latin polyphony, and chorales based on distinctively declassé German dance tunes. This fusion of old and new, high and low, was part of the genius of Luther's liturgical reforms, and it is the vision that will continue to be my guiding light in the months - perhaps years - ahead.
